The Permanent Fund The Rotary Foundation's endowment



There are two ways of giving to The Rotary Foundation (TRF). Giving to the Annual Programs Fund and giving to the Permanent Fund. Giving to the Annual Programs Fund is the money that is invested for 3 years with the earnings in these 3 years being used to finance the administration of TRF. In 3 years time the funds contributed are split in 2 with one ½ coming back for the District to use as District Designated Funds, the other ½ goes into the World Fund to finance Rotary's humanitarian works.

Funds donated to the Permanent Fund are never spent. The earnings of the Permanent Fund are transferred to the World Fund to finance Rotary's humanitarian works. This way the work of the funds donated to the Permanent Fund are immortal, always working, long after the other service work of the Rotarians who made donations.

The TRF Committee have launched the District 9670 Immortal pin to raise funds for the Permanent Fund of TRF. For your donation of \$100 you will receive an Immortal Pin, see the donation information at the end of this article.

In any Rotary year, about \$4.5 million, the interest and earnings of the Permanent Fund are made available to support The Rotary Foundation programs. The next fund raising target for the Foundations Permanent Fund is \$1 billion by 2025, imagine how much good that can do.

This will take place in Newcastle Town Hall, at 6.30pm on Monday, 22nd June, 2009.

There has been publicity in the press, but word-of-mouth is the best advertising, so let everyone you know about this Forum. It is to give information about mental health situations, and aims also to have us all realise that there are no differences between mental health and physical health, except in the symptoms. We know that depression hits about one in four people some time during their lives – so that's a lot of us! Recovery is mostly complete, and may take a little help from the professionals, and people usually return to normal life. The Forum is to help us understand this process.

Julia R Ellis PhD, BSc (Hons) received an Australian Rotary Health Ian Scott Fellowship for Mental Illness Research in 2007.

Dr Ellis' research examined the relationship between the brain's nicotinic receptors – proteins that can affect cognitive processes such as attention and memory - and cognitive function in early Alzheimer's disease.



Dr Ellis was awarded her PhD degree at Monash University in December 2008. She writes:

"This would not have been possible without the financial support and numerous opportunities available to me as an Ian Scott Fellow during my PhD candidature. I would like to thank Australian Rotary Health for its wonderful work. I would also like to acknowledge the generous contributions and ongoing support of Rotarians from Rotary Clubs all around Australia."

"In the last four years I have been fortunate to witness first-hand the growth of Australian Rotary Health, particularly its exposure in the medical science community. I have acknowledged the support of the Fund in journal publications on my research. I hope this helps to spread the word about this important research organisation."

"I am working as a Clinical Research Associate with the International Centre for Therapeutic Research at Servier Laboratories, a French pharmaceutical company. I am working on a clinical trial in Alzheimer's disease and I am really enjoying the work. Next week I leave for Paris where I will attend trial-related meetings and three weeks of intensive training provided to all new research associates."

Australian Rotary Health congratulates Dr Ellis on attaining her PhD and her continuing research on Alzheimer's disease.

I have also been invited to join the Rotaract Club in Port Moresby.

I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank everyone who have made all these wonderful thing happen.

I believe God has given me a second chance. I hope to serve my country and make you all very proud of me.

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

This assembly requires all Member Nations to adopt a moratorium on all whaling including that conducted for claimed scientific purpose.

How would you go debating this resolution? What about if you had to represent Japan and debate it?

What about this one? What you if were representing Iran's point of view?

This assembly calls on all member nations to act positively to protect women's rights in Iraq and to improve conditions for women and girls who are yet to feel the benefits of Iraq's recovery.

These are just two of the resolutions devised by the Rotary District 9670 Secretary-General, Wilma Simmons, for this year's MUNA that was held in Muswellbrook this year. Thirsty eight young people from 14 schools from across District 9670 (including a team from Cobar HS) attended the assembly and had a challenging but rewarding time over the day and a half.

Once again the Rotary Club of Muswellbrook hosted MUNA with the opening dinner being attended by many Rotarians, the students and their team counsellors. District Governor, Alex McHarg and Pam McHarg and DGE Greg Bevan and Lorraine Bevan were on hand to perform some official duty. The guest speaker for the night was the Mayor Of Muswellbrook, Martin Rush.

Martin Rush was an excellent choice as guest speaker as part from being very interested in international affairs he is related to Dr Hebert Evatt, who was President of the General Assembly of the United Nations (1946 – 1948). Martin also studied at the University of Jerusalem.

MUNA itself was held at the Muswellbrook Council Chambers on Saturday, 9th May. Each team had previously nominated the country they would represent so students had arrived with much research and something to identify themselves with the country. This varied from fully robed Arabic looking men (Iran) to young people wearing berets and carrying French bread sticks (France).

Debates took place from 9am to 3pm so students were tired but happy by the end of the day. RC Muswellbrook ensured that everyone was well fed (thank you!!! – sustenance is extremely important for active minds).

The adjudicators were Rotarians Megan and Greg Valentine (RC Newcastle Sunrise) and Phil Lawler (RC Muswellbrook) and their job was very difficult. So difficult that joint winners were announced.

A team will leave for Mando Project Papua New Guinea on the 8th June, to carry out more of the much needed work at the Mando Primary School.

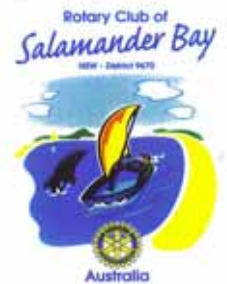

To improve the capacity of individuals to support others who develop a mental illness (eg. peers at school or members of the workforce);

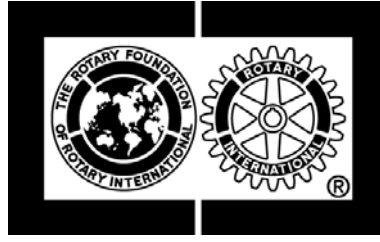
To improve the capacity of individuals to access relevant services if they develop a mental illness, and to help others to do this when they need help.

Rotary World Peace Fellows



Rotary World Peace Fellows are leaders promoting national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict throughout their lives, in their careers, and through service activities. Fellows can earn either a master's degree in international relations, public administration, sustainable development, peace studies, conflict resolution, or a related field, or a professional development certificate in peace and conflict resolution.

The former are the result of a two academic year program at one of the six Rotary Centers for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution. The latter program, designed for mid-career middle management, is a three month program held at the Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok.

Each year, up to 110 Rotary World Peace Fellowships (60 master's degree fellowships and 50 professional development certificate fellowships) are offered on a competitive basis at seven Rotary Centers, which operate in partnership with eight leading universities worldwide.
