Assistant Governors

I have always been of the opinion that the role of Assistant Governor is very special and as such deserves to have its profile in the district elevated. We have 10 very capable and knowledgeable Rotarians who fill this role and it is one of my goals this year to increase the recognition of Assistant Governors. It is a wonderful role and one which is so important to the effective operation of our district.

To commence this process each month we will highlight a different person in the Newsletter so each Rotarian in our district will become more familiar with our Assistant Governors from the different zones. This month I would like to present Assistant Governor Chris Boswell from the Rotary Club of Newcastle.

Chris has been a Rotarian for over twenty years and was President of the Rotary Club of Newcastle in 2007-08 in the year of PDG Tony MacKenzie. Chris was very involved in the organisation of the district conference that year which was an absolute credit to his club. Chris has a great love of Rotary which stems in some part from having his father as a Rotarian. He has a great appreciation of our organisation and great desire to help other people. He is a true Rotarian.

In his vocation Chris is Technical Director - Strategic Group.

Chris's experience comes from initially two sources, BHP Steel and, for the past 19 years, the work with SIT (now the Strategic Group).

During Chris's last 10 years with BHP, he managed several large multi-million dollar projects, and was appointed Group Manager with a total budget responsibility of \$27 million per annum. This involvement took him to many overseas sites, included USA, UK, throughout Europe and several deployments in Japan.

Strategic began in 1989 with two people and has now grown to a staff of over 20 with offices in Newcastle and Sydney. Strategic has deployed systems throughout Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, Indonesia and more recently China.

Chris has a Degree in Electrical Engineering and a Masters in Computer Engineering. He has had several technical papers published in International publications, and his work in high level integrated circuit design led to one of the “chips” being manufactured by NASA and used on a space shuttle mission.

Since taking over the role of AG this Rotary year in Zone 8, Chris has hit the ground running. He has the philosophy that if he is involved he will give it 110%. Each of his clubs will benefit greatly from his influence.



Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

The General assembly,

*... **Strongly condemns** the ongoing systematic violations of civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights of the people of Myanmar;*

***Strongly calls** upon the Government of Myanmar:*

To ensure full respect for all human rights and fundamental freedoms and to protect the inhabitants of the country...

This is only part of Resolution 4 at the National Model United Nations Assembly held in the House of Representatives Chamber, Old Parliament House, Canberra 14th to 16th August this year. In all there were six resolutions:

- Towards a new international economic order;
- Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban treaty;
- Situation of human rights in the Islamic Republic of Iran;
- Situation of human rights in Myanmar;
- Protection of migrants; and

Security implications of climate change.

The two winning teams from the District 9670 MUNA held in Muswellbrook in May this year participated in this national event. James Doyle and Tristan Rallings, from St Phillip's Christian College, Port Stephens and Nilarni Jayakumar and Alexander Winn from Merewether High School spent an action filled weekend in Canberra. James and Tristan represented Israel while the Merewether team represented the United Kingdom.

Over the weekend, the program included some exciting guest speakers, one of note being the Counsellor to the Turkish Embassy, Tuna Yucel and Christopher Woodthorpe, Director of the United Nations Information Centre. The young people were also treated to afternoon tea with the Governor-General, Quentin Bryce.

The students commented that it was a really difficult task to prepare and debate these resolutions as they were more detailed and complicated than those at MUNA in Muswellbrook. This national event however did have teams from all over Australia (East Doncaster, Sale, Southport, Wagga Wagga, to name a few areas), as well as teams from Rotary District 9710.



The students found the weekend and the competition most enjoyable. The thrill of debating in the beautiful building of Old Parliament House and the thought that in years gone by, people like Sir Robert Menzies and Gough Whitlam were prominent speakers in the same chambers, made the journey south very worthwhile.

Our team of Nilarni and Alexander (see photo), representing the United Kingdom received the Totenhofer Peace Prize. The adjudicators determined this prize that is awarded to the team that makes the most significant contribution to issues concerned with the promotion of world peace. Well done, Nilarni and Alex!

Congratulations to both teams for a great result and for their diligence over the weekend and the lead up to the National MUNA. A big thank you also to their supervisors/counsellors for the event.

Sincere thanks is extended to the Rotary Clubs of Salamander Bay and Newcastle Enterprise for their sponsorship of this event. I know the students appreciated the opportunity to pit their minds and tongues against students representing the other countries.

District 9670 Membership Development and Extension

Zone 8 NEWSLETTER September 2009 Vol.6 No.3 It is timely reminder to check our club's procedures for proposing new members.

Proposing a New Member

Membership is every Rotarian's responsibility. Each new member must be proposed for membership by an active member of the club. If you know someone who has all the qualities of a good Rotarian and you're an active member of a Rotary club, consider proposing that person for membership.

Identifying qualified candidates

Qualified candidates for Rotary club membership are adults of good character and business, professional, or community reputation who fit one of the following criteria:

- Hold or have held a position with discretionary authority in any worthy and recognized business or profession
- Serve as a community leader
- Is a Rotary Foundation alumnus

All candidates should also demonstrate a commitment to service through personal involvement, be able to meet the club's attendance and community project participation requirements, and live or work in the vicinity of the club or the surrounding area.

Proposing a New Member

Once it becomes clear that the prospective member is interested in membership:

- Complete Part A of the Membership Proposal Form, and return the form to your club secretary for submission to the club's board of directors. Remember: Don't inform a prospective member of the proposal until after the board approves it.
- Wait for the club secretary to notify you of the board's decision, which should come within 30 days or earlier of the submission.

After your club board approves the candidate:

- Have the club or proposer arrange an information session for the proposed member.
- Ask the proposed member to complete and sign Part B of the proposal form.
- Publish the proposed member's name and classification to the club. The Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws allow seven days for club members to consider and file objections, if any.
- If no objections are received, the proposed member pays the admission fee and becomes a Rotarian.
- The club secretary or president reports the new member to Rotary International.

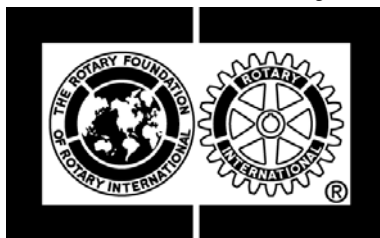

The following is a communication from the Glenn E. Estess Sr. 2009-10 Chair, The Rotary Foundation Trustees

Dear Rotarians,

At their April 2009 meeting, The Rotary Foundation Trustees examined how the global economic crisis had affected the Foundation's ability to support Rotarians' good work worldwide. Like many foundations, we have been forced to reduce program spending, and consequently the Matching Grants budget was reduced for 2009-10.

The Foundation started processing Matching Grant applications on 1 July 2009 and has received an extremely high volume of applications in excess of those received in previous years. Applications have been submitted for approval in the order of the date they are complete and meet all of the Trustee requirements.

Recognizing the vital role that Matching Grants play in improving the lives of underserved communities around the world, the Trustees recently added an additional US \$2.3 million to the 2009-10 Matching Grants budget. [These funds were recently made available from reduced grant spending in 2008-09.](#) However, at this time, despite the budget increase, the Matching Grants budget has been fully committed.

As a result of these grants, many outstanding projects have been supported at a time when they are most needed. Clubs and districts that wish to continue to pursue Matching Grants this Rotary Year are encouraged to fund their projects entirely with cash and DDF contributions in lieu of receiving a match from The Rotary Foundation. Sponsors of pending Matching Grant applications will be notified of this option by their grant coordinator. Please note that the project budget must be a minimum of US \$10,000 to utilize this option.

Thank you for your understanding as we persevere together through these challenging economic times.

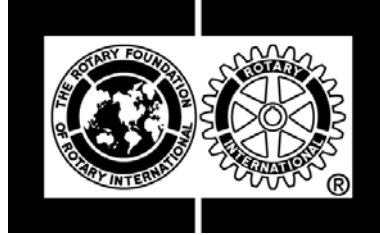

You may have noticed in a different article in this newsletter that The Rotary Foundation (TRF) Trustees has been forced to reduce Foundation spending due to the economic crises, and in fact, no more Matching Grants (MGs) will be funded this year.

What does that mean for District 9670?

It does not mean Clubs should hold off looking for projects which can be funded through Matching Grants. Matching Grant Applications will be processed by the Trustees of the Rotary Foundation in the order of the date they are complete and meet all of the Trustee requirements, so any applications which have not been funded to date will be still sitting there waiting on funds. The District has some District Designated Funds (DDF) available to assist Clubs with Matching Grants but the application process needs to be completed. So get your application in now and get in line for when funds are available.

Where does the money come from?

District Designated Funds are 50% of the contributions made by Individual Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and Rotary Districts in a Rotary year in unrestricted giving to the Annual Programs Fund. The other 50% goes into the World Fund which also receives the earnings from the Permanent Fund. The District allocates where its 50% will be spent and the Foundation Trustees allocate the funds from the World Fund to fund Matching Grants and the other work of the Rotary Foundation.

Don't forget the two ways of giving, Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) to the TRF Annual programs Fund, or become a District 9670 Immortal by sending \$100 to the TRF Permanent Fund. (see the information below)

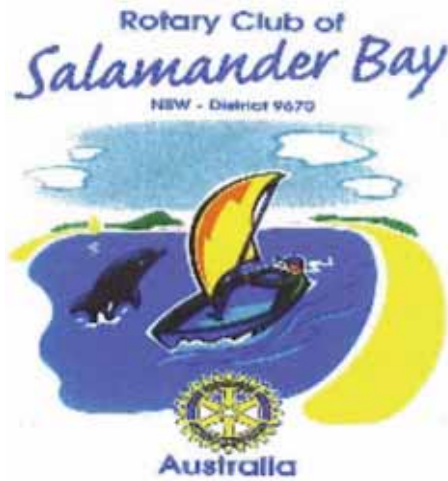

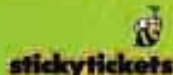
